Resumes:

In the U.S., resumes should be limited to one page and should not include personal information like photos or birthdate. Submit your resume for review through [ResumeCheck](#) by uploading it to [SpiderConnect](#).

Networking:

Making contact with UR alumni and other professionals in the field you are interested in is a powerful job search strategy and a great way to learn more about career fields and receive valuable advice. American culture values initiative, and direct and open communication. Career advisors can help you practice communicating professionally. Use these resources to develop an [“elevator pitch” or “personal commercial”](#) and learn how to use [LinkedIn](#) effectively.

Interviewing:

Interviewing is your chance to highlight your relevant skills and experiences. Arrive on time, make eye contact with the interviewer, and display confidence in your qualifications. Make sure you research the organization beforehand so you can demonstrate your knowledge of the company, and go to the interview prepared with questions to ask about the opportunity and the organization. Career Advising
